Durham Cathedral.

The Dean and Chapter Estates Office and Archives Room, in the Prior's Kitchen, holds legal documents, deeds, and titles, maps and plans, pertaining to their property in the lands of Jarrow-with-Heworth, dating from Medieval times, when Heworth was a Chapel-of-Ease, within the monastic lands of Jarrow.

Heworth, in this context, was the area bounded by the River Tyne to the north, by the lands of Hebburn, Monkton, Boldon and Washington to the east, of Eighton and Wrekenton to the south, and the medieval Borough of Gateshead to the west. The district of Carr Hill was part of Heworth Chapelry until 1835, when it was annexed by the new County Borough of Gateshead.

Durham 28th March 1814.

Dear Sir,

It is the wish of the Deans Chapter, for the sake of Good Neighbourhood between Mr. Bramwell and the Lessees of Heworth, for the Parties to appoint each a professional man for the survey of the Road in question & assess such Damages either by Statute Duty or a sum of Money to be paid annually, adequate to what damage may have been done to the Road by their exercising the privileges granted the Lessors.

The Surveyors ought to take into consideration what damage may have been done since the commencement of Mr. Nicholson's lease; the whole of the Lessees that use the Road either by leading Stones, Manure etc; must contribute in proportion towards its repair. I am etc. etc.

Being called upon by the Dean & Chapter Tenants in the Chaselry of Heworth, to award a Plan of repairing the Road from a Quay called the Tenants Quay, on the River Tyne near Snowdens Hole and the Village of Heworth; I recommend the following rules to be put into Practice:-

That Mr. Nicholson be requested to give a statement of the expense he has been at in repairing the Road since Sept 19th 1811. and that the respective proprietors of the Deans Chapter's Estates according to Messrs Bainbridge & Adamsons award on the said 19th Sept. shall refund him in full expenses, according to the value of their respective properties. Should the said proprietors not be satisfied with Mr. Nicholson's statement, then a Surveyor of Highways be called upon to say what the probable expense of repairing this Road ought to have been during the said period, and his decision be final.

2. That, in future each Tenant contribute towards the repair of this Road according to the Tonage he leads along it.

necessary and for applying more freestones
to fill in the present Sparlings (if not made

& keeping water off the road, and drawing
the Sparlings together, this is all comprised
in our Shilling per Yard forward from Heworth
to the Quay; but mark well, in this our

30th Dec. 1814.

At a Vestry Meeting of the Deans & Chapter tenants in the Chappeltry of Heworth, it was agreed that the sum of Two pence should be paid by every tenant for every Loaden Cart drawn by a single Horse, each time it shall pass upon the within mentioned Road, and for every additional Horse, to pay one penny more per time (Non-tenants to pay Double.)

Also, that Mr. Bramwell be refunded Thirty Pounds for past repairs upon this Road, the sum to be paid by the Persons who have occupied it, by their correct Proportions.

And that Mr. Russell & Mr Sanderson have the power of putting these Resolutions into effect from January 1815 to January 1816.

At a meeting of the Vestry, holden Sept. 23rd 1819,
it was unanimously agreed on the motion of
Mr John Wylam, seconded by Mr Robert Wylam, that
the management of the Parish Quay be put

into the hands of Mr. Thomas Burn, of which office Mr. Burn accepted.

Also it was agreed on the motion of Mr. William Rowntree, seconded by Mr. John Wylam, that Mr. Russell, Mr. Wylam, Mr. Sill, Mr. Bramwell, & Mr. Burn be a committee to ascertain the boundaries of the Parish Quay, & that they record their report in this book.

Maintaining the Poor in Heworth in 1830 to 1846.
 From minutes of the Select Vestry Poor Relief Committee.

May 1830. Robert Foreman, the Supervisor of the Poor House will supply food, clothing, bedsteads, wine, ale, porter, tobacco for men and women who are paupers of this parish. The men will be shaved once a week. Fuel will be provided for the comfort of visitors. He may have free use of the Premises and the gardens. No extra comforts may be supplied to the poor of other townships. He will receive 3s 3d for each inmate for the coming twelve months.

Mr. Mark will continue as Surgeon to the Poor House.

A Clogmaker will be appointed for the Poor of the Chapelry.

June 1831. Mr. Matthew Laws, having visited the Poor House, found that some of the children were sent to school without shoes or stockings. The Vestry resolved that Mr. Foreman be informed he is in future to send them in foot wear in all weathers.

March 1832. No Idiots can be allowed as Inmates of the Poor House. Either they must be removed to the Lunatic Asylum, or Relief of 1s 6d per week given to their families.

April 1832. In future when Pauper Boys are apprenticed, the Overseers will pay the Masters to whom they are bound, no more than £3 for the necessary Indentures.

October 1832. Messrs Frost and McAllum are appointed Surgeons to the In and Out-Poor of this Chapelry at a Salary of £15 per annum each, while the present dreadful epidemics of the Cholera Morbus continue.

December 1832. The Workhouse Poor must be put to breaking stones for the highways and also to shifting ballast upon the Parish Quay.

May 1833. Two paupers employed at St. Anthony's Pottery have been removed to this Chapelry incapacitated by burns.

June 1833. Expenses for any child pauper's funeral must not exceed seven shillings.

June 1833 Memorandum: (upon enquiry into the costs of feeding the inmates of the Poorhouse); Best Beef and Mutton is now selling at 6d to 1s 6d per pound. Best Ground Flour is now selling at 1s 10d. per stone. Best Scotch Oatmeal is now selling at 1s 5d. per stone.

May 1834. Mr. George Cameron's proposal to make coffins for the Parish are agreed to, viz: - 3 feet long and under, at 3s 9d each; Above 3 feet and not exceeding 5 feet, at 7s 0d each; Above 5 feet to any length, at 9s 0d each.

October 1836. Ordered that Thos. Cummings be allowed to paint the Workhouse inside and out for the sum of £2. 19s. 6d.

January 1840. Ordered that Jane — may be admitted an orphan to the Workhouse, her grandfather having left an adequate sum for her maintenance there.

July 1840. The family of Peter — an Irishman, will not be maintained by this Parish, but a Removal Order to be entered in the Book, and the sum of £2, will be procured to transport him, his wife and five children, back to Ireland.

March 1846. Ordered that William — until one year ago an inmate of the Workhouse, be relieved with 4 shillings a week, and Mr. Sill be instructed to wait on Mr. Headlam, and request him to supply this amount, him having rode him down, and lamed him at a Steeplechase.

The Heworth Poor - From The Overseers of the Poor Minutes Book.

May 1830.

"Robert Foreman, the supervisor of the Poor House, will provide food, clothing, bedsteads, wine, ale, porter, and tobacco for men and women who are inmate paupers of this parish. The men will be shaved once a week. Fuel will be supplied for the comfort of visitors. No extra comforts may be provided for the Poor of other townships who reside in Heworth for the time being.

He may have free use of the premises and the gardens, and the produce thereof for the paupers. He will receive 3s. 3d. (16p) for each inmate for the coming twelvemonths.

Mr. Mark will continue as Surgeon to the Poor House.

A clogmaker will be appointed for the Poor of the Chapelry.

Mr. Matthew Laws, visiting the Poor House, found that some of the children were sent to school without shoes or stockings. The Vestry will inform the Supervisor he is in future to send them in footwear in all weathers.

No idiots can be allowed as inmates. Either they must be removed to the lunatic asylum, or their families given 1s. 6d. relief per week.

In future, when pauper boys are apprenticed, the Overseers will pay the masters to whom they are bound, no more than £3 for the necessary indentures.

The able paupers must be put to breaking stones for the highways, and also to shifting ballast upon the Parish Quay.

Members of the poor relief committee will visit the Poor House as often as once each week if possible, and make regular reports to the Overseers and the Vestry meetings."

Newcastle 21 October 1839

Gentlemen

It is with sensations of regret mingled with pleasure that I beg to inform you that I have today resigned into the hands of the Bishop of Durham the living of Jarrow-with-Herworth. I regret that the long and amicable connection of upwards of a quarter of a century that has subsisted between the paroch and myself has thus been rather suddenly severed: but I rejoice with hope that all its best interests will be promoted by my yielding up a charge to which I have not been able within some years past to pay that attention which its important nature demanded.

Aousing you of the affectionate regard and friendship which I feel shall always feel for the inhabitants of the Chapel of Herworth and of the great satisfaction which I shall always have in hearing of both their spiritual and temporal welfare.

The home addresses of the men roughly coincided with their area of employment. Thus, most of the pitmen and quarry men lived at High Heworth and Windy Nook. Many watermen, boatmen and ship's craftsmen like mast & sail makers, lived by the river shore. Farm workers were mostly from Wardley, The Leam, Upper and Nether Heworth.

A currier, cured leather; a tallow chandler made & sold cheap candles; a chapman or a hawker, was a pedlar. Banksmen worked at the Pit head. Trimmers levelled loads of coal into holds at the staithes. The colliery viewer was Wm Bailes, manager at Felling Colliery.

From Bell Inn to Boworth Lane there is no serious nuisance existing, but have requested the several parties interested to remove those which were considered injurious, and have every reason to expect that the wishes of the Committee will be carried out. From Boworth Lane to Croydon Lane the district as a whole is better than they expected to find it, but deposits of ashes (some of which have accumulated for some time) and a want of privies is the general foliage of the District. From the Croydon Lane to Grays Road there is a general accumulation of Ashes and the Committee would express their regret, that in the whole of this district there are scarcely any privies and a general want of drainage. In the following there are some nuisances which the Committee have complained of, but owing to its exposed situation there is no reason to expect that epidemic disease will visit to any great extent here. In conclusion the Committee would express that every way they found the parties willing to assist them.

Every Easter the annual Vestry meeting
was held in Heworth Church & 12-24
men appointed a Select Vestry - to govern
the whole parish. It included:-

2 Churchwardens

An Overseer of the Poor and one assistant

An Overseer of the Highways and an
assistant

the Parish Clerk, who did all the minutes,
and public notices.

Various committees for appointing
constables, verger, sexton, schoolmaster,
(usually the Clerk), & fixed their wages.

The Vestry set the church rate and the
poor rate each year, collected taxes, tithes,
looked after weights & measures & many
other things.

The County Magistrates (J.P.s) confirmed
their selection. Every one was a property
owning ratepayer.

Heworth Chapelry, between 1540-1843, was within
the Parish of Tarrow St. Paul.

After 1843 it became a separate Parish of

HEWORTH INTERCHANGE

We have recently been informed that Felling Council, local officials and the members of the Tyneside Passenger Transport Executive are agreed that the bus and rail interchange at Heworth is essential to Tyneside's Rapid Transit System.

Having discussed the matter personally with Mr. Howard, the P.T.E. Director of Planning and having convened and chaired a meeting in the parish hall, at which, Mr. Howard explained in detail the whole scheme with particular reference to Heworth, I am fully persuaded that not only is the proposed interchange essential to the Rapid Transit System but that it will be of great benefit to the people of Felling too.

This does not mean that I have no misgivings about it. I feel very sorry for those who live in the immediate vicinity of the proposed interchange, since it is bound to affect their lives considerably for many years to come. No matter how considerate those responsible for carrying out the work are, the chaos caused will be very great during the period allowed for its building. It is very little consolation to say that in about 10 years time all will be well! I firmly believe that "the powers that be" have a very clear duty to minimise the inconvenience and distress of the residents of Heworth during the operations: they will have a lot to answer for if they don't!

One of the things that concerns me as Vicar of Heworth is the effect of the proposed interchange on the life of the Church at Heworth. Of course it could have a serious effect during the building operations when, as it seems to me, there will be unavoidable chaos. But, on the other hand, it could have a beneficial effect. It will depend entirely upon the attitude we take towards it. If we take the view that the Rapid Transit System with an Interchange at Heworth is going to be of benefit to Tyneside, and Felling in particular, then we shall rise to the challenge

presented by the chaos incurred during the building operations. Looking back over our recent history, it appears to me that we have coped fairly successfully with bigger challenges - the re-roofing of the parish church, being without a parish hall, the construction of the by-pass and then living with the by-pass which separates the greater part of the parish from the parish church. The challenge of all these things has strengthened our Church life rather than weakened it, so if we as a Church community take what I believe to be the right attitude to this I see that we have nothing to fear.

When Mr. Howard spoke at the meeting held in the parish hall, he seemed to answer very well all the objections hurled at him from the floor - objections concerning noise, pollution, traffic congestion, the car park, the removal of the school and the appearance of the place generally once the work is completed. He assured us that there would be less noise, less pollution of the atmosphere and less traffic congestion if the scheme is brought to fruition than there would be if the scheme was thrown out. With regard to the school, he informed the meeting that the education authorities were already thinking of moving the school to Pelaw, since the catchment area for the school lay on the other side of the by-pass. I have always felt that the position of the school is dangerous for the children attending, and particularly for those coming from the other side of the by-pass and I know that many parents of the children are worried by it. It is intended that the car park should meet the needs of the local community only and that there was absolutely no intention of making Heworth into a mammoth car park for Newcastle. Finally, he assured us that, despite the removal of some familiar landmarks, the area would be much improved in appearance.

It is my intention to convene further meetings with regard to the Interchange so that the P.T.E. can be made aware of local feeling.

CHURCH ROOF

Some 40 years ago our Church roof had major work done to it as a result of dry rot. This work cost approx. £15,000, which at that time was a tremendous amount of money to raise. The main roof of the Church is still in good repair, however, the Tower roof and both Transepts are again in need of major repairs.

The Tower roof is currently covered with lead. Due to the small area with a trap door in the middle, movement of the lead is restricted and breaks away from the flashing causing the roof to leak and if not attended to will damage the wooden beams.

The Transept roofs were changed into flat felt roofs when the new roof was put on. Although this has lasted well we have suffered regularly from rain coming mainly in the Lady Chapel but latterly above the stairs to the Upper Vestry. Both of these roofs have been re-felted with numerous minor patching being carried out over the years. In spite of this, after a heavy rain storm the roofs still leak.

When the Architect inspected the Church and submitted the Quinquennial Report he proposed that the Tower roof be replaced with a steel covering with a change to the slope direction. For a roof of this size, this is perfectly adequate and will not require movements as with a lead roof. Repairs are also to be carried out on the guttering and flashings. It is anticipated that this work done, the roof should need no further attention for approximately 60 years. This work is to be carried out within this Quinquennial period.

His proposal for the Transept roofs is a much bigger project. Firstly temporary repairs were to be carried out to stop the roof leaking. These have been done and the roof still leaked during the last heavy rain storm. Consideration is to be given to replacing the current flat roofs with a slightly sloping roofs to aid drainage. The material to cover the roofs would be a more durable material saving on replacement and repair bills in the future.

Now comes the bit you have all been waiting for THE COST.

At present the Architect is in the process of drawing up detailed plans to submit to contractors to gain accurate costings. However, he did give us a guesstimate of approx. £40,000. As stated this is only a guess and may be considerably different once costings are received from contractors. This seems like an enormous amount of money to raise but is probably much smaller than £15,000 was 40 years ago.

It is hoped that much of this money can be raised through grants (although to gain significant amounts this way it will be necessary to do this work as a single project). The Architect is also prepared to work on the applications for grant aid on our behalf and hopes to obtain about 75% of the cost in this way. However this still leaves us with anything between £10,000 and £40,000 to raise on current anticipated costs. As you will appreciate when applying for grants there are no guarantees.

This is obviously a major fund raising project for the church and like the last roof project and the bells appeal we hope that we can raise money from outside the Church as well as the usual support which we can always rely on from our own congregation.

The PCC Standing Committee are to for the group which will co-ordinate this project with the co-opting of others as is necessary. If you have any fund raising ideas they would be greatly appreciated and can be given, preferably in writing, to the Churchwardens.

When more accurate details are known we will inform you further.

Any support you can give this project will be gratefully appreciated.

Below is an extract which goes some way to show the horrific circumstances in which people are living and how comfortable our lives are. Many times in the book the author, who was fortunately out of the country at the time of the genocide in 1994, reflects on what her reaction would be faced with these circumstances. Maybe we should ask ourselves the same question.

Lesley Bilinda worked for Tear Fund in Rwanda and while out there, married a Rwandan Pastor, who is believed to have been killed in the 1994 genocide. On her return to Britain she found it extremely hard to talk of what she had seen and heard in that country.

This is a short passage from her book, 'The Colour of Darkness'.

On the rare occasions when I was able to find a response to people's concerned questions, and give just a tiny glimpse of what others had been through, I often found the questioner so overwhelmed that I ended up comforting them.

And yet I wanted to shout about it from the rooftops. I wanted to shake people out of their comfortable complacency and shock them with the reality of life in Rwanda. 'How would you feel if you were walking over your vegetable garden and discovered it was a mass grave?' I wanted to ask. 'Or if you learned that your dog had stayed alive for six months by eating dead human flesh, left rotting over the hillsides? Or that your niece had died on your sister-in-law's back, clubbed to death by a wooden stick spiked all around with nails?





held 23rd April, 1995.

EASTER VESTRY

Minutes of the last Easter Vestry were taken as read, agreed and signed.

Thanks were given to the Churchwardens, Mr J.A. Trodden and Mrs A. O'Connor for their hard work and dedication to the parish during their years of offices and especially during the interregnum and in their support to Revd. D. Taylor during his first year in the parish.. The nominations for Churchwarden were Mrs D.M. Snowball and Mrs J. Warden, as there were no further nominations, they were duly elected.

Mr J.Trodden spoke to the meeting regarding the PCC proposal of the introduction of a 4th Year Ruling. Any committee or organisation benefits from experienced members but it also needs new ideas and enthusiasms. A combination of both is ideal.

To facilitate this the PCC recommends that Church Wardens and PCC members are elected for a period of four years and that one quarter of the PCC retire each year.

The Following provisions or reservations need to be made:

1. The Treasurer and Secretary would not be affected by this rule.
2. Retiring members would be eligible for election after one year out of office.
3. The committee would need to be divided into 4 groups by length of service and/or agreement to serve 1,2,3, or 4 years.
4. Deanery Synod Representatives and Church Wardens are Ex-Officio members of the PCC so the rule would not effect their position.
5. Where a situation arises when retiring members cannot be decided by agreement or Length of service the matter will be decide by lot.

It was proposed by Mr. J. Trodden seconded by Mrs. A. O'Connor that the above recommendations be adopted. All agreed.

Mrs J. Warden spoke of behalf of both the Churchwardens asked everyone for their support and help in the coming year and for their vote of confidence in electing them for the ensuing year.

Minutes of the last Annual Parochial Church Meeting were taken as read, agreed and signed.

Electoral Roll

Thanks were given to Mrs E. Pickering who was unable to be present due to ill health. Her report stated that 3 names had been added and 3 names removed over the past year making the number currently 195.

Mrs E. Pickering has stated that she no longer wish to continue as electoral roll officer and thanks were given for her work over many years.

Mrs A. O'Connor was proposed by J. Trodden seconded by R. Holliday as new electoral roll officer. There being no further nominations she was duly elected.

Our Buildings - Church

The Church - No major work has been carried out this year but one of the vestries has been adapted for office use with a light and electric sockets. We did get a faculty before the work was began!

The Quinquennial Inspection - Calls for some minor inexpensive work now and one major repair within 5 years. The latter is the removal of the tower roof gutter and flashings. Renewal of felting on North and South Transept roofs is desirable but in our opinion not necessary at the moment.

Hall - New burner and electrical controls fitted to central heating boiler now working satisfactorily.

Painting inside and out must be carried out as soon as possible.

The worn asphalt path is to be replaced with paving stones.

A new cooker, extractor fan, water heater and emergency electric fan heaters are to be provided by Social services for the use of the Day Centre.

Door closers have been fitted to the double doors into the hall at the request and expense of the Mother and Toddlers group.

Northfield - New doors were fitted to the outhouses by the Crafty Working Party. The house was decorated before occupation by Captain Keith Belbin. A downstairs hall cupboard has been converted to a cloakroom with toilet at the expense of Keith.

Vicarage - Extensive alterations and repairs were carried out by the parsonages committee and we were called upon to contribute £1250. Our share of the decoration costs was only £100.09 because we carried out the work ourselves. Thanks are due to Keith Brown who guided us and carried out the tricky work himself.

Our PCC

Mrs D.M. Snowball reported there had been 10 PCC meetings, 2 standing committee meetings and 3 mission steering group meetings over the past year.

We have acquired a Priest-in-Charge and Church Army Captain during the past year for which we are very grateful.

The PCC in the past year have discussed and instituted the Sunday Newsletter and the Bookstall at the back of Church. They established a Social Committee and a Fund Raising Committee which have organised or co-ordinated numerous events during the year.

We also had a day visit from Bishop Alan to our parish when he met with many of our PCC members at lunch time and talk about the grasping of opportunities in Evangelism. He spoke of the three things which the parish should be considering

- a) The Family (caring for the church family)
- b) The Neighbours (caring and working with our neighbouring churches)
- c) The Decade of Evangelism (working together and individually to bring God to those outside the church).

Thanks were given to Mrs D.M. Snowball for her work over this last year.



Committees

The PCC operates through just one committee, which meets between full meetings of the PCC:

Standing Committee

This is the only committee required by law. It has power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council.

Church Attendance

There are 164 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, 68 of whom are not resident within the parish. The usual average Sunday attendance is 110 but this number increases at festivals.

The full PCC met 10 times during the year with an average level of attendance of 85%

Review of the Year

It is with some trepidation that we approach this report for two reasons. The first is because this is normally the job of the Vicar and secondly because of the year which we have to review. We do feel though that there is much which needs to be said.

This has been a year like no other. Last May/June all of us experienced a variety of emotions – shock, disbelief, despair and even anger. We had lost not only our Vicar, but also a very good friend. A person we could laugh and cry with, a person who constantly pulled our legs, but whom we knew cared deeply about us all. A personality which was summed up so well in the poem written by Rob and which I know many of you have a copy of. Yet as we got through that first awful week and then the next few weeks and as the weeks turned to months we began to realise that the hard work of David had not been in vain. David constantly reminded us that we are a family here at St. Mary's and that as such we should love and care for each other and his ministry amongst us was spent building that up in all sorts of ways. What we experienced then and what we go on experiencing almost a year on, is the love and care of the family at St. Mary's. We feel that what we have been through together this year has strengthened us and instead of standing still we have grown in our love of each other and of God – a great tribute to David. How we have needed each other this year, and as Churchwardens we want to pay tribute to the family here because we don't know how we would have got through this year without your support.

That family feeling, that feeling of wanting to be together has shown itself in many different ways. Numbers at services have remained reasonably stable, everything has been kept as normal as possible, even though it often meant a lot of extra work for many people, and new ventures have begun, such as the very successful Sunday Lunches which grew from a need to be together initially and have continued. During our evening services on Sundays in Lent we have been looking at the seven deadly sins, of which pride is one, but we feel that as a family here we can all feel a proper sense of pride in how we have coped this year – we also feel that David would be extremely proud of us all.

There was a determination amongst us all from the beginning of this interregnum that what was started should be brought to fruition. Nowhere has that been seen more clearly than in the main project of the year – the refurbishment of the Lady Chapel. We knew that it was something we had to do and so the faculty forms were filled in, the necessary permission was given and then began the many months of frustration, as nothing seemed to go according to plan. However it was all worth it when on 13th February Bishop Alan finally rededicated the Lady Chapel in a service which had in it a real feeling of strength and fulfilment.

We cannot talk about this year without thanking so many people and we know that you would wish us to do that on your behalf. Our first thanks must go to two of our own people – Phyllis and Keith. Both of them have taken on a lot of extra work this year, particularly Phyllis latterly when Keith has been in ill health. Without the hard work of those two people our job would have been a lot harder. Because of them, all weekday services have been kept going, the only casualty being the one on Thursday morning. We need also to thank the Diocese for the love and care which they showed to us from the first day. Bishop Michael and Bishop Alan have been a great support to us, as of course has Frank White our Archdeacon, but we must also mention the Archdeacon of Durham who was such a tremendous support in so many ways on those first two Sundays. Then there are the other clergy who have helped us out from our own deanery and beyond, and last but by no means least – Chris Atkinson our Area Dean. Knowing that he is just at the other end of a phone has certainly been a great help to both of us, as has the fact that we haven't had to find clergy to do Sundays.

This Lent, on three Thursday evenings, ending this week, we have followed a Lent Course with a difference. The Worship Group decided that it should be called "Growing into New Life" so that it would reflect, not only the New Life of Easter, but also the New Life which we as a church are growing towards. All involved in the course on Thursday evenings and the children one Sunday morning have produced together banners, poems, prayers and pictures which say what we want to say about our life together. All of these will be displayed at Easter and will hopefully say something to us all.

On July 16th we will welcome Val and John, Naomi and Rebecca into our family here and that will be a new chapter for us all. Whilst not forgetting the past, but building on it, we will move forward together into a new adventure. We know that you will give Val your full support as she and her family make the move and she begins her Ministry here. In the meantime this interregnum is not ended and we would like to think that in its final weeks we will be as supportive of each other as we have been in this last year so that we can continue to move forward as a loving community working together for God in Heworth.

Once again, thank you for everything.

Churchwardens Report

OUR BUILDINGS

Church and Churchyard

A lot of time last year was taken up by the refurbishment of the Lady Chapel, it was a difficult time and lots of unforeseen problems had to be overcome but as we see now the Chapel has been successfully completed - it caused many sleepless nights!

During the winter gales some roofing tiles were brought down and had to be replaced, during this work it was found that the ridge tiles on the main roof of the Church were in need of re-pointing and a section of cement had opened up on the lead flashings above the Sanctuary. The repair work on both items has now been completed.

In the Vestry a small section of the leaded windows has corroded resulting in two small panes of glass having broken away. This needs to be replaced as soon as possible.

Overall the Church is in a good state of repair and the interior is always well cared for due to the efforts of the cleaning teams and work parties.

Church Hall

We had two break-ins of the Boiler House in the last year and four lawnmowers and a strimmer were stolen and extensive damage done to the doors.

Insurance claims met all costs of repairs and replacement mowers. The interior of the Hall is in good shape once again due to the efforts of the Caretakers and Cleaners.

As stated in last year's report the exterior of the Hall still needs repainting and the windows all need to have the putty replaced, this and other outside work was due to commence in January by a training team from the YMCA, but I am doubtful of this happening now and we might have to do this ourselves.

Many thanks go to the Gardening Club and Grasscutters, and working parties who keep the hall grounds in a good state.

Northfield

Estimates for the replacement of the windows have been accepted and this work will be done soon. The Canopy and Front door of the house needs painting and this will be done after the window replacements.

HEWORTH COMMON

"An Act for Dividing and Inclosing the Moor, Waste or Common in the several Townships, Villages or Hamlets of Upper Heworth and Nether Heworth in the County of Durham" was passed in 1766. The preamble to this Act reads:-

Whereas there is in the several Townships, Villages or Hamlets of Upper Heworth and Nether Heworth, in the County of Durham, a certain Common or Tract of Waste Ground commonly called or known by the Name of Heworth Fell, Moor or Common, containing by Estimation four hundred and sixty-seven Acres, or thereabouts, which at present yields little Profit; but the same, by being inclosed, wculd become capable of considerable Improvement:

And Whereas the Dean and Chapter of Durham of the Cathedral Church of Christ and Blessed Mary the Virgin, in right of their said Church, are Owners of the Soil and Inheritance, and of the Royalties of the said Fell, Moor or Common:

And Whereas Charles Brandling, of Gosforth, in the County of Northumberland, Esquire, or his Trustees, Lessees, Farmers or Tenants in respect of, or as appendant, appurtenant or belonging to certain Freehold Messuages, Lands and Tenements at Felling in the said County of Durham, is or are entitled to a Right of Common in and upon the said Moor, Waste or Common, called Heworth Fell, Moor or Common; and the said Dean and Chapter of Durham, and the said Charles Brandling, John Colvill, and several other Persons, Lessees of and under the said Dean and Chapter of the several other Messuages, Farmholds, Lands and Tenements in the said several Townships or Hamlets of Upper Heworth and Nether Heworth aforesaid in respect of, or as appendant or appurtenant, or belonging to the said several Messuages, Farmholds, Lands or Tenements, are intitled to Right of Common in and upon the said Heworth Fell, Moor or Common:

And Whereas the said Dean and Chapter, the said Charles Brandling, and the several other Persons aforesaid, who have such exclusive Right of Common as aforesaid, are willing and desirous that so much of the said Moor or Common, as hereafter is specified, should be divided and inclosed by Commissioners in that Behalf to be appointed:

But although such Division and Inclosure will be a manifest Advantage to the Persons interested in the Premises, and tend greatly to the Improvement of their said sevoral Estates: Yet the same cannot be established or rendered effectual to answer their Intentions, without the Aid of an Act of Parliament.

Treasurer's Report

Well, here we are reporting on the last year of the 20th Century.

As you can see, we have a surplus of £1599.51 which is £4333.43 down on last year. If it had not been for the Barrow Sales of £1347.58 we would have had a surplus of only £251.93.

I did predict last year that 1999 could be a different year to 1998 as our quota was going up by £3577 and interest rates were dropping, which they did and we had £576 less interest than in 1998 even though the interest was on a greater amount. Ordinary Church collections and Baptism collections went up fractionally but Wedding & Funeral collections were down, as were the number of Weddings & Funerals held. This also meant that the money we receive as fees was down. Planned giving was down by £1239 which means the tax claimed back on covenanted planned giving will be down in 2000. Also the government has reduced the percentage that we are able to claim back.

We know that our quota for this year has gone up by £1250, which is £24 per week. As I have explained before, we have no control over this but must make every effort to meet it. I am pleased to report that as usual we met our quota in full and always consider it a priority to do so.

In view of all that I have just said we must be even more prudent with our spending and make sure our income is maintained as much as possible and try and come up with some ideas to increase our income.

Yet again I am sure the P.C.C. would like to thank all of the parishioners and friends of St. Mary's who have supported the Church during a difficult year for us all the look forward to their continued support during this first year of the new millennium.

Gateshead and Hillgate in Gateshead, both of which are contained in the Feodarium under distinct heads, are specifically included in the Inventarium of 1446 under Pipewelgate. The tenements which the Prior and Convent possessed there came to them in the same manner as those in Pipewelgate.

¹ Heworth, Over and Nether, though parcels of the parish of Jarrow, do not appear to have passed to the monks by the grant of Bishop Walcher, unless, as is not probable, they are represented by the Heathewurthe, noted by Symeon as amongst the appendages of the vill of Gyruu, in his list of places given by the Bishop to the newly re-established religious house at Jarrow. In one of

the spurious foundation charters of Durham Cathedral, irrespective of other independent occurrences of Hethworth and Heworth, side by side, which seem clearly to identify the former with Hedworth, we have "duas Heworthas" preceding Gyrue and other places given by Walcher, among which is Hethewortha. This shows the opinion of the scribe of the 12th century. In connexion with this it must, however, be noticed that in the Cottonian MS of Symeon, one of very great, if not equal, authority with that at Durham, from which Bedford printed the text of his edition, the word is Heawurth. Leland also, in his *Collectanea*, vol. i. p. 382, copying from a book, in his time on the High Altar at Durham, amongst the appendages of Jarrow mentions Heworth, evidently Heuworth, there being no distinction in manuscripts between *u* and *n*.

If Heworth is not Symeon's Heathewurthe, which it is difficult to disconnect from the later Hetheworth or Hedworth, there is no evidence to show how the vill came into the possession of the monks, unless indeed, "boscus de Hewurth," to be presently referred to, is supposed to be a term sufficiently large to include the later vills. The words themselves, however, seem to imply the existence of a place to which the wood was a neighbour, and from which it got its name; and this must have been the feeling of the scribe of the spurious charter already mentioned, since he mentions "In Werhale totam terram in bosco et plano juxta Tynam, ex orientali parte de Mareburn usque ad mare," before he comes to the two Heworts and

ST. MARY'S CHURCH - HEWORTH PLANNED GIVING 1999-00

A brief report of the Planned Giving Contributions based on the amount received from April 1999 to March 2000 :-

The number of givers in the scheme totalled **105**.

The amount of uncovenanted giving totalled	5,718
The amount of covenanted giving totalled	<u>13,059</u>
The total amount collected was	18,777

This amounted to a decrease of **5.30%** on the previous year (1998-99).
The average weekly total was **18,777 / 52 = 361.10**. (An average decrease of **£20** per week compared to 1998/99).

This gives a weekly average, of those participating in the scheme, of about **3.44**.

Thank you all for the splendid effort that you have made during the past financial year. It is going to take another tremendous effort during this financial year to keep our income at its current level, as we have already lost some valued members from the scheme. In addition to our planned giving, we have coin collections from normal services, weddings and funerals. However, these are unpredictable, so our financial stability is dependent upon our envelope scheme.

COVENANTING

This year I expect to submit a claim for approximately **£3900** from the Inland Revenue. This is about **£89** less than last year.

A factor that has an effect on the amount that can be claimed is that any government decreases in the Basic Rate of Income Tax, mean a decrease in the amount of tax that can be claimed back.

If anyone would like information on covenanting please feel free to contact me. Basically, what it means is, that if you are in the envelope scheme, and you pay Income Tax through the normal channels, then the Church can claim tax back from the Inland Revenue on the amount you give, without any extra cost to yourselves. Thanks to everyone for the help that you have given me in this important task during the past year.

The first notice of the wood in question is supplied by Leland, *Coll. vol. i.* 390, quoting from a confirming or restoring charter of Bishop Ranulf Flamhard, the original of which is not now at Durham, "confirmo eis Blaikestun et Standrop et Standropshiram, boscum etiam de Henworth, ex orientali parte de Mareburn quamdiu durat versus mare. Testes, Gul. Sygill et Gul. de Ponte Arco." The clause which Leland quotes, as from a charter of Bishop Ranulf, is found in a confirmation by Henry I., of doubtful authenticity (*2^{da} 1^{ma} Reg.*, 4), two of the witnesses to which are Robertus de Sigill' and Willelmus de Ponte Arch'. Is it possible that Leland has given a wrong reference, and that the charter he quotes is that of King Henry? That the wood was in the hands of the monks before Flamhard's time is alleged in the following charter of Bishop Hugo de Pusat.

The charter of Bishop William the First, referred to in the above great claim, may have been the forged general charter still remaining in the Treasury at Durham, or, possibly, a genuine document, destroyed at some time after the spurious instruments of King William the First, Bishop William the First, and others, had been manufactured. The following grants by Bishop Philip de Pictavia and the confirmation of King John refer to the same estate. From the terms of the first of them, it would seem as if Bishop Philip had taken possession of the wood, quitclaimed by his predecessor, and which by the deed in question he restores. This circumstance makes it probable that there was some uncertainty as to the title of the Convent to the estate in question, and Bishop Philip may have asserted his right to it and made it good, so far at least as obtaining possession of it was concerned. It will be remembered that Bishop Ranulf Flamhard made restitution to the Convent of various estates which he was said to have abstracted from that body; the same course seems to have been pursued by Bishop Philip in a lesser degree. It is unlikely that these so-called robberies were such in fact, and an explanation may be given which would relieve the two bishops from the imputation of being spoilers of the Church. In the early times of the first bishops at Lindisfarne, and later on when the seat of the Bernician Episcopate was transferred to Chester le Street, the land given to the Church and to St. Cuthbert was hardly distinguishable as Episcopal and Monastic, for the interests of the two bodies being one, the estates were the property of the general body, of which the bishop and monks

were parts. In course of time a separation was made between estates of the see and others given or devoted for the ministers of the Church; and eventually two entirely distinct corporations existed, with different and at times conflicting interests. Under such circumstances, a certain confusion must necessarily have arisen with regard to some of the estates, which had once been the common property of the two, as belonging to St. Cuthbert; and to which, as representing him, each corporation might assert a claim, and not be satisfied with the severance which Bishop William I. had made (see Symeon, cap. Ixii). And it is not unlikely that in this way the so-called abstractions of Bishop Flamhard originated, he asserting his right to land which, though at the time in the hands of the Convent, was not held by any title sufficiently clear to prevent him from reclaiming what, it might be asserted, belonged to the see. In judging as to the merits of the transactions between Bishop Flamhard and the Convent, it must not be forgotten that the accounts we have are all on the one side, that of the monks, by whom any reclamation of estates would not unnaturally be regarded as robbery.

Committees

The PCC operates through just one committee, which meets between full meetings of the PCC:

Standing Committee

This is the only committee required by law. It has power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council.

Church Attendance

There are 164 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, 68 of whom are not resident within the parish. The usual average Sunday attendance is 110 but this number increases at festivals.

The full PCC met 10 times during the year with an average level of attendance of 85%

Review of the Year

It is with some trepidation that we approach this report for two reasons. The first is because this is normally the job of the Vicar and secondly because of the year which we have to review. We do feel though that there is much which needs to be said.

This has been a year like no other. Last May/June all of us experienced a variety of emotions – shock, disbelief, despair and even anger. We had lost not only our Vicar, but also a very good friend. A person we could laugh and cry with, a person who constantly pulled our legs, but whom we knew cared deeply about us all. A personality which was summed up so well in the poem written by Rob and which I know many of you have a copy of. Yet as we got through that first awful week and then the next few weeks and as the weeks turned to months we began to realise that the hard work of David had not been in vain. David constantly reminded us that we are a family here at St. Mary's and that as such we should love and care for each other and his ministry amongst us was spent building that up in all sorts of ways. What we experienced then and what we go on experiencing almost a year on, is the love and care of the family at St. Mary's. We feel that what we have been through together this year has strengthened us and instead of standing still we have grown in our love of each other and of God – a great tribute to David. How we have needed each other this year, and as Churchwardens we want to pay tribute to the family here because we don't know how we would have got through this year without your support.

That family feeling, that feeling of wanting to be together has shown itself in many different ways. Numbers at services have remained reasonably stable, everything has been kept as normal as possible, even though it often meant a lot of extra work for many people, and new ventures have begun, such as the very successful Sunday Lunches which grew from a need to be together initially and have continued. During our evening services on Sundays in Lent we have been looking at the seven deadly sins, of which pride is one, but we feel that as a family here we can all feel a proper sense of pride in how we have coped this year – we also feel that David would be extremely proud of us all.

There was a determination amongst us all from the beginning of this interregnum that what was started should be brought to fruition. Nowhere has that been seen more clearly than in the main project of the year – the refurbishment of the Lady Chapel. We knew that it was something we had to do and so the faculty forms were filled in, the necessary permission was given and then began the many months of frustration, as nothing seemed to go according to plan. However it was all worth it when on 13th February Bishop Alan finally rededicated the Lady Chapel in a service which had in it a real feeling of strength and fulfilment.

We cannot talk about this year without thanking so many people and we know that you would wish us to do that on your behalf. Our first thanks must go to two of our own people – Phyllis and Keith. Both of them have taken on a lot of extra work this year, particularly Phyllis latterly when Keith has been in ill health. Without the hard work of those two people our job would have been a lot harder. Because of them, all weekday services have been kept going, the only casualty being the one on Thursday morning. We need also to thank the Diocese for the love and care which they showed to us from the first day. Bishop Michael and Bishop Alan have been a great support to us, as of course has Frank White our Archdeacon, but we must also mention the Archdeacon of Durham who was such a tremendous support in so many ways on those first two Sundays. Then there are the other clergy who have helped us out from our own deanery and beyond, and last but by no means least – Chris Atkinson our Area Dean. Knowing that he is just at the other end of a phone has certainly been a great help to both of us, as has the fact that we haven't had to find clergy to do Sundays.

This Lent, on three Thursday evenings, ending this week, we have followed a Lent Course with a difference. The Worship Group decided that it should be called "Growing into New Life" so that it would reflect, not only the New Life of Easter, but also the New Life which we as a church are growing towards. All involved in the course on Thursday evenings and the children one Sunday morning have produced together banners, poems, prayers and pictures which say what we want to say about our life together. All of these will be displayed at Easter and will hopefully say something to us all.

On July 16th we will welcome Val and John, Naomi and Rebecca into our family here and that will be a new chapter for us all. Whilst not forgetting the past, but building on it, we will move forward together into a new adventure. We know that you will give Val your full support as she and her family make the move and she begins her Ministry here. In the meantime this interregnum is not ended and we would like to think that in its final weeks we will be as supportive of each other as we have been in this last year so that we can continue to move forward as a loving community working together for God in Heworth.

Once again, thank you for everything.

OUR BUILDINGS

Church and Churchyard

A lot of time last year was taken up by the refurbishment of the Lady Chapel, it was a difficult time and lots of unforeseen problems had to be overcome but as we see now the Chapel has been successfully completed - it caused many sleepless nights!

During the winter gales some roofing tiles were brought down and had to be replaced, during this work it was found that the ridge tiles on the main roof of the Church were in need of re-pointing and a section of cement had opened up on the lead flashings above the Sanctuary. The repair work on both items has now been completed.

In the Vestry a small section of the leaded windows has corroded resulting in two small panes of glass having broken away. This needs to be replaced as soon as possible.

Overall the Church is in a good state of repair and the interior is always well cared for due to the efforts of the cleaning teams and work parties.

The two following documents throw considerable light upon the estate of the Prior and Convent at Heworth; the second one settles the position of Mereburn, so often mentioned in the previous charters. It and "the causey" still form boundaries between Gateshead and the Heworths, but it can never have been more than a very small stream of water.

¹ Felling is an estate in the township of Heworth, and after its forfeiture by the family of Selby, became the property of the Surtees family, who held it for many generations. It was taken out from the waste of Heworth and given to Walter de Selby by the following grant from the Convent of Durham. We here obtain the appropriate name of Blackburn for the eastern boundary of the estate, a stream (now a mere sewer) running through the modern village of Felling.

The estate was held in 1605 by Robert Brandling, according to Hutchinson, *Hist. of Durham*, vol. ii. p. 480, who, quoting from Rudd's MSS., gives the following account of his oath of fealty. Dicto Roberto Brandling flexis genibus sic dicente. "I do become yours and the Chapter's man from this day forward for life, and member and earthly honour, and to you shall be faithful and loyal, and shall be in faith to you for the lands which I do clayme to hold of you, saveing the faith I owe to our Sovereign Lord the King, and to such other lords as I hold of."

² Follonsby, close to Heworth, and also in the parish of Jarrow, is not mentioned by Symeon. It lies to the south of the Wrekendyke, which ancient road probably bounded the enclosed and cultivated lands at the time of Bishop Walcher's gift. At some later time, and not unlikely when Thorold obtained his grant, Follonsby appears to have been carved out of the moor, the march land between the Prior and Convent's possessions on the north of the Wrekendyke, and the land of the Bishop further to the south. The difficulty created by the grants of Bishops Galfrid and Hugh of an estate, which belonged to the Prior and Convent, is thus removed, for, if the supposition stated above is correct, these grants refer to the boundaries of a new piece of enclosed land, which bordered upon

Treasurer's Report

Well, here we are reporting on the last year of the 20th Century.

As you can see, we have a surplus of £1599.51 which is £4333.43 down on last year. If it had not been for the Barrow Sales of £1347.58 we would have had a surplus of only £251.93.

I did predict last year that 1999 could be a different year to 1998 as our quota was going up by £3577 and interest rates were dropping, which they did and we had £576 less interest than in 1998 even though the interest was on a greater amount. Ordinary Church collections and Baptism collections went up fractionally but Wedding & Funeral collections were down, as were the number of Weddings & Funerals held. This also meant that the money we receive as fees was down. Planned giving was down by £1239 which means the tax claimed back on covenanted planned giving will be down in 2000. Also the government has reduced the percentage that we are able to claim back.

We know that our quota for this year has gone up by £1250, which is £24 per week. As I have explained before, we have no control over this but must make every effort to meet it. I am pleased to report that as usual we met our quota in full and always consider it a priority to do so.

In view of all that I have just said we must be even more prudent with our spending and make sure our income is maintained as much as possible and try and come up with some ideas to increase our income.

Yet again I am sure the P.C.C. would like to thank all of the parishioners and friends of St. Mary's who have supported the Church during a difficult year for us all the look forward to their continued support during this first year of the new millennium.



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ST. MARY'S CHURCH - HEWORTH PLANNED GIVING 1999-00

A brief report of the Planned Giving Contributions based on the amount received from April 1999 to March 2000 :-

The number of givers in the scheme totalled **105**.

The amount of uncovenanted giving totalled	5,718
The amount of covenanted giving totalled	<u>13,059</u>
The total amount collected was	18,777

This amounted to a decrease of **5.30%** on the previous year (1998-99).
The average weekly total was **18,777 / 52 = 361.10**. (An average decrease of **£20** per week compared to 1998/99).

This gives a weekly average, of those participating in the scheme, of about **3.44**.

Thank you all for the splendid effort that you have made during the past financial year. It is going to take another tremendous effort during this financial year to keep our income at its current level, as we have already lost some valued members from the scheme. In addition to our planned giving, we have coin collections from normal services, weddings and funerals. However, these are unpredictable, so our financial stability is dependent upon our envelope scheme.

COVENANTING

This year I expect to submit a claim for approximately **£3900** from the Inland Revenue. This is about **£89** less than last year.

A factor that has an effect on the amount that can be claimed is that any government decreases in the Basic Rate of Income Tax, mean a decrease in the amount of tax that can be claimed back.

If anyone would like information on covenanting please feel free to contact me. Basically, what it means is, that if you are in the envelope scheme, and you pay Income Tax through the normal channels, then the Church can claim tax back from the Inland Revenue on the amount you give, without any extra cost to yourselves. Thanks to everyone for the help that you have given me in this important task during the past year.

Committees

The PCC operates through just one committee which meets between full meetings of the PCC.

Standing Committee

This is the only committee required by law. It has power to transact the business of the PCC between meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council.

Church Attendance

There are 155 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, 67 of whom are not resident within the parish. The average Sunday attendance is 98 but this number increases at festivals.

The full PCC met 9 times during the year with an average level of attendance of 87%.

Review of the Year

2002 Annual report

Last year we could not have imagined what would greet us on the very morning of the APCM. In the early hours of April 27th the vestry door had been set on fire and we spent most of our energy after that date putting the church back in order. It is because of the fire we did not achieve what we hoped however, when you reflect upon things, we did more than we might have imagined possible and some of the jobs were becoming urgent. The building is now in very good condition and even if we have yet to clean the pews and the organ, these things seem minimal compared to the smoke damage which resulted after the fire.

Our urgent list now includes that toilet and kitchen facility. This year I hope we can do all that we hope for today and possibly more. The building is only half of the task. The people who come are another.

When you come week after week to church to one particular service it's easy to imagine nothing else happens in here. The 8.00am people know that the 10.00am service takes place but I doubt if they know many of the people and vice versa. Why not swap services now and again just to see another side of St. Mary's. It would be good to see regular worshippers attend one of our monthly Baptism Services. If not just to see the building full to the brim. St. Mary's has many faces. There are also times when children's voices are heard as a dominant voice. Pram Services continue and RE lessons still continue. It was particularly wonderful to hear the sound of the young people from Heworth Grange Comprehensive School when they performed for us in March. Clapping and joyful celebration was the means by which we raised money for the Eleanor Lily Foundation, a charity set up to fund research into Gaucher's Type 2. This is a genetic condition which usually takes the life of very young children. Eleanor Lily was Baptised at home during the last weeks of her life, she was seven months old when she died on 9th February this year. I am particularly grateful to those who supported this event. It was a unique example of how a Christian community can be the vehicle through which comfort and help is given by strangers to strangers who then become friends. This is Christian Mission making friends for Christ. This is an urgent need in this place. Ian and Jill (Ellie's Parents) are just the tip of the iceberg. I can give you names of so many more people who have experienced tragedy these last few months. How can we respond? How can we open the doors of this church to the community in which we are called to live? Unless we do this our life here is a waste of God's time and our energy.

So my message this year is one of urgency – how much time do we have to make this church into a welcoming and growing community of Faith? If we do not do something about the dwindling numbers – more faithful people are dying than joining our fellowship – so please take care of yourselves! I pray for few distractions for all of us from the task of nurturing new faith in people

who may be keen to join us but are shy about doing so. Look at the numbers coming for Baptism, look at the crowded church on Christmas Eve at the Christingle Service. There are people who at the moment exist on the fringe of what we do and we must take account of them. This brings me to the quality of what we offer. Is this a church you would make an effort to join if you did not know anyone? A church worth the effort has no time for fragile or broken relationships. These prevent us from moving forward. There is no time or energy to argue or cause trouble for each other. Every ounce of faith and energy we have will be needed to create a place of welcome for other people.

I want to thank all of you for the contribution you make to our life here at St. Mary's and indeed in the Deanery and locality. I make no distinction this year between the various gifts I see exercised around the place and those which are exercised in secret. I also ask you to think of developing new gifts and discovering new ways of serving God. I'd hate you to become bored with what you do. Please recruit someone this year who can help you. Do this by encouragement not blame. In humility not with pride, sweetness works far better than punishment.

Since last year Keith Belbin has retired due to ill health and I want to record my thanks to him for all his support and help in my time here at St. Mary's. I also wish him well in his search for a new home. I also thank Phyllis for her energy and faithfulness and Dorothy for her work and ability to make me laugh when things go wrong. Amy Collingwood retires as verger this year and I am grateful and thankful for all she did. Colin has stepped into her shoes and has had a busy year so far with funerals. Be encouraged the wedding season starts soon.

Last year George was sworn in for his first year as churchwarden and what a year it was. Not many people realise how much work both church wardens have had to do and without them we would not have such a beautiful building – I know other people support them, please continue to do so.

The PCC has plenty to keep occupied for the next few months. Please pray for each member that God will bless us all as we seek to serve him.



Treasurer's Report

As you can see, we have a surplus this year of £661.43. This surplus is after a number of major repairs etc. totalling £3,208.00, which includes a new church door (not the one damaged by the fire), security lights outside both church doors, roof repairs and gutter cleaning. Last year we had a deficit of £1,467.83, which means we have done £2,129.26 better than last year, and after our new door etc. Of course we never know when we are going to have anything major to do and must always try and be ready for such an event.

Planned giving was up by £2,905.00 and funeral, wedding and baptism collections were up by £767.00. General donations were down this year by £767.00 from £3,165.00 to £2,938.00, which is still a brilliant amount and we thank everyone who made them. Fees were almost the same as last year with a slight increase of £283.00. General fund raising was up by £763.00 to £7,796.00, which is great, and hall income was up slightly by £216.00. Apart from the quota, which went up by £1,254.00, which we have no control over and the major expenditure on the new door and security lights etc. we have kept the rest of our spending fairly under control.

Yet again, as always, costs keep rising (and we know that the quota is up by £474.00 this year, which is a smaller increase than we usually have), therefore we need to continue to be prudent in our spending and keep looking at ways to increase our income.

As always, I am sure we would like to thank all of the parishioners and friends of St. Mary's who have supported the Church during 2003 and we look forward their continued support.

priated the tithes of the townships of Jarrow and Heworth (strictly so called), together with the responsibility of providing for the due performance of parochial service in both places, reserving to themselves the tithes of the other numerous townships within the parish: that these duties were duly performed by the monks may not be doubted; but, as the annual revenue of the cell of Jarrow did not at the Dissolution amount to 200*l.*, it was dissolved by the first spoliatory statute, and in consequence its revenues (the above tithes included) fell away for ever from the church into the hands of the Crown or its grantees, and until recent times, under the operation of Queen Anne's Bounty, and other charitable aids, the emoluments of the curacy consisted only of a pension of ten marks (6*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.*) per annum, payable by the lay impro priators (the owners of what had belonged to the monks, and which had in their time been devoted to sacred purposes), together with the surplice fees. The population of Jarrow and Heworth amounted in 1811, three years after the commencement of Hodgson's incumbency, to 6,303 souls. The income at that time, from all sources, was not more than 116*l.* per annum. There was no glebe house, and the distance between the church and its chapel was four and a quarter miles, and the circuit of the parish was considerable; so that a horse was required, and yet Hodgson could only afford to keep a horse for the first two or three years of his incumbency, afterwards he borrowed or walked. But it may be convenient to anticipate here somewhat of the subsequent history of the parish in point of its emoluments. Things had not long continued in this state of poverty before Hodgson made an effort to procure an augmentation to his benefice from the fund of Queen Anne's Bounty, but difficulties presented themselves, and for a while he gave up his attempt in despair. In 1815 however he was more fortunate; Jarrow was in that year augmented with 500*l.*, 200*l.* being contributed by Lord Crewe's trustees, and 300*l.* by Queen Anne's Bounty. In 1818 another sum of 500*l.* was raised, 100*l.* being contributed by the Pyncombe trustees, 100*l.* by Hodgson himself, and 300*l.* by parliamentary grant. In 1819 again Hodgson succeeded in obtaining from the governors of Queen Anne's Bounty two additional allotments of 200*l.* each. This sum

of 1,400*l.* in all was afterwards laid out in the purchase of a small farm called Lough House, in the parish of Stamfordham, for the benefit of the living.

From the commencement of Mr. Hodgson's incumbency, divine service was performed in the morning or afternoon at Jarrow and Heworth on alternate Sundays; but, as he resided at Heworth, this latter place had always an evening service, in addition to that in the morning or afternoon, according to its turn; so that, over and above his other ministerial functions, such as reading prayers thrice, baptisms, marriages, funerals, &c.* which were generally very numerous, Hodgson preached three sermons every Sunday.

"That's a wonderful man, that Mr. Hodgson," said a gentleman one evening in Durham, in a crowded room, whilst looking on and talking over a whist table. "Ye'll hardly believe it, but he has the churches of Heworth and Jarrow, and he has so many duties every Sunday, of one kind or another, that he's never done; and yet after all he gives a second evening service at Heworth; but he is sometimes so tired that he can only read the exhortation and confession before he begins his sermon." "That's very wrong," spoke a reverend personage, "very wrong, Sir; quite contrary to the canons." "The canons," replied the first speaker, "the canons, did you say? Why as to the canons, *just that*," snapping the forefinger and thumb of his right hand, with such a noise that there was an instant silence in the room; "the canons, you know, my Lord, say a clergyman is not to play at cards, and there you are, a bishop, with the ace of trumps in your hand." The bishop was the chaplain of 1802, by whom poor Hodgson had been rejected in his examination for Holy Orders, and the gentleman, who is happily still alive, was a privileged person in the habit of telling plain truths in a way peculiar to himself, a man who has not unfrequently said a good thing, and, with all his peculiarities, has done many a kind one.

In the year 1809, after he had resided a year at Heworth, Hodgson began another poem, with the exalted title of "The Creation," in which however, he made but little progress.

* A portion of land was inclosed within the chapel yard and consecrated as an additional burial-ground for the chapelry of Heworth, in Sept. 1808, a few weeks after the commencement of Mr. Hodgson's incumbency.

But this meeting orders that the parish be not charged in future with any expenses of this sort, notwithstanding any Resolution that may have been heretofore entered into of a contrary effect.

Ordered that one penny, in the pound upon the present rental be laid on for the use of the Chapel, and that it be paid to the Chapelwardens by the Overseer of the Poor, but not inserted in the accounts respecting the poor.



THE HEWORTH CHAPELWARDENS' ACCOUNTS FOR JANUARY 1813, SHOW THE SIX SHILLINGS FOR VINEGAR, USED AS A DISINFECTANT BY THE SEXTON AND THE GRAVEDIGGERS, WHEN BURYING THE FELLING COLLIERY EXPLOSION VICTIMS.

VICTORIA HIST. LIBRARY NO. 15/149

At a meeting held at the Wheat Sheaf in Nether Heaworth on Wednesday the 27th day of May 1812, it was unanimously resolved :-

- 1st. That the object of this meeting is to promote a subscription for the relief of the widows, orphans and others dependent on those who perished in the colliery at Felling on Monday, the 25th of May, instant.
- 2nd. That a committee of nine be appointed to carry out the designs of this meeting.
- 3rd. That the committee will wait upon the Rector of Gateshead and the Mayor of Newcastle to request them to call meetings in their respective towns, and by so doing, to devise measures which will be the best and wisest way to forward the object of this meeting.
- 4th. That this committee obtain a list of the names of the sufferers, the names and ages of their widows, orphans and other dependants, and to process such information, as is necessary to understand the extent of the Calamity.
- 5th. That a meeting be again convened as soon as possible after opinions from meetings in Newcastle and Gateshead shall be obtained.
- 6th. That the committee consist of the following persons -

Thomas Sill; Mr. Robert Wylam; and Mr. William Hamilton.
- 7th. That the above resolutions be advertised in the Newcastle papers. Signed in behalf of and at the request of the meeting. John Hodgson. Chairman.

Since the above meeting, the committee find that 92 persons, whose names they have procured, perished in this most calamitous event, 86 of them yet remaining in the ruins of the mine, without any possibility of raising them out, until the fire therein can be somehow extinguished. Tuesday, 2nd June 1812.

Heworth at Malmesbury 6015 K/6

Felling Colliery.
At a meeting of the committee for the relief of the sufferers, at Heworth on June 1st, it was resolved that subscriptions for the widows and orphans of Felling be immediately solicited from house to house collections throughout this Chapeltry. That the names of Christopher Bramwell Esq., Mr. Thomas Wylam, Mr Richard Kell, and Mr. William Cock, be added to the committee. And that subscriptions of five shillings or upwards, be advertised in the Newcastle papers, but that every widow's mite be taken.

The committee can now inform the public that other committees for the relief of the sufferers have been established in the parishes of Monkwearmouth and of Bishopwearmouth. (Names included)

Lists of subscriptions will be regularly published, the most notable so far are:-

The Pitmen and other workmen of Tarrow Colliery, have subscribed one day's pay for the relief of the families of the men deceased in the explosion at Felling Colliery.

Tyne Mercury. June 1st.

At a meeting held in the Vestry at Tarrow Church on May 31st, a committee was formed, as at Heworth, for the same purpose, with the Revd. John Hodgson as Treasurer. Cuthbert Ellison Esq. headed the Tarrow list with his contribution of £21, and his household, servants and workmen subscribed £4. 9s 6d.

ACCOMPT HANDBK FOR 1812

The inhabitants of South Shields held a meeting some days after the Felling Colliery Explosion where it was agreed to form a committee on the plan of the one at Heworth, to collect subscriptions in their town and neighbourhood for the support of the widows and orphans of the dead.

The committee elected was Sir Cuthbert Heron Bart; Mr Fox; Mr. R.B. Roxby; Mr. Magnay; Mr. Craster; Mr. Wawn; Mr Kirkley; Mr. Bulmer; Mr. C Bainbridge and Mr. T. Bell. Mr. Fox was elected as Treasurer.

Between May 29th and June 4th all the above members made contributions of several pounds each - (list included) and there were 36 donations of 3 Shillings, 54 donations of 2 shillings and six pence, 62 of 2 Shillings, 8 of one and six pence, 198 of 1 shilling, and £3. 3s. 9d was given by people at less than 1 shilling each.

Tyne Mercury June 9th 1812 :.

"It will be seen from the front page of this newspaper that the subscriptions for the families of the sufferers in the Felling Explosion, proceed with a spirit worthy of the cause, and promise to alleviate, as far as pecuniary aid can, that mass of human grief and misery occasioned by the terrible accident.

A collection for the above cause was made on Sunday last in the Methodist Chapel at Wallsend Colliery, which amounted to £11. 15s. 6d.

Here we think it proper to note the liberality of the non-commissioned officers and privates of the South Shields Volunteers, who on the 4th of June, voluntarily and unanimously offered their one day's pay for the poor families of the Pitmen who have suffered at Mr. Brandling's Colliery. This charity of feeling with those who now suffer such hardship, from a body of the same rank as those who are bereft, is worthy of being recorded with respect."

NEWCASTLE AT MAY 5 1812

Felling Colliery.

"This day, June 10th, has been published, price 3d, a sermon preached in the parish church of West Boldon on Sunday June 7th, by the Rector, John Preston M.A., for the benefit of the poor families deprived by the dreadful explosion at the Felling Colliery. It is printed by Edward Walker of Pilgrim Street, to be sold in the diocese of Durham."

The list of subscriptions show that the collection in Boldon Church on Sunday last after the sermon was given, reached £14 14s 0d. The Revd. T. Baker sent another £8 which was collected on the same day in Whitburn Church."

Tyne Mercury. June 10th 1812

"The coal owners of this neighbourhood have established a fund for the benefit of disabled pitmen and their families, out of which they have voted £400 to the Felling Colliery sufferers."

Tyne Mercury June 23rd 1812

"On Sunday evening, June 21st, a sermon was preached by the Revd. Robert Gray D.D. of Bishopwearmouth Church, for the relief of the sufferers at Felling Colliery, after which the sum of £33. 14s 3d was collected. The same day a collection was made in Darlington church for the same purpose which amounted to £4. 10s. 6d."

Tyne Mercury June 30th 1812

"On Wednesday, July 8th, the devastated colliery at Felling was opened for the first time since the dreadful accident. The bodies of only five of the victims have been found."

MENWORTH AT MARY'S BOX 5 15/153

"Forty five of the sufferers at Felling Colliery have been interred at Heworth, forty of them having been got out since the pit was last opened to retrieve five poor bodies. The boards or workings are expected to be reached in a few days."

Tyne Mercury. July 21st.

"On Sunday last, after a sermon by the Revd. John Hampson M.A. in the parish church of Sunderland, from the first book of Timothy, Chapter Six, a collection was made amounting to £46 14s 0d, for the widows and orphans of the colliery at Low Felling."

Tyne Mercury July 28th.

"The bodies of all the sufferers in the Felling Colliery explosion have been found, except four."

Tyne Mercury Aug. 11th.

"The exertions of the Revd. John Hodgson, on behalf of the relatives of the sufferers at Felling Colliery, within his parish, have been too conspicuous to pass unnoticed, and are honourable evidence of his character as a Christian of great compassion.

The subscription list now amounts to £2,486 14s 11d - a sum far exceeding the expectations of even the most sanguine, and undoubtedly is to be attributed in great degree, to the unremitting diligence of Mr. Hodgson, who is the chairman of the fund. He has in addition the harrowing task of conducting the burials of the dead in his chapel at Heworth amidst the great sorrows of his congregation. A most notable subscription has very lately been received from the parish of Ford, which amounted to the sum of £15. 15s. 0d."

Tyne Mercury. Aug 11th.

The Heworth Committee for the relief of the Yelling Colliery victims gave regular reports to the newspapers. -

"How thoroughly and systematically the Heworth Committee did its collecting is shown by these entries in our columns announcing the progress of the fund -
Aug 13th 1812 - £31. 12s 0d collected in St. Andrew's Parish in Newcastle by Messrs Major and R Wylam of the Heworth Committee. The inhabitants of this parish who were not at home at the time of collection were respectfully informed that they will be waited on at a future date, to enable them to make a contribution.

Aug 4th 1812. A collection in the parish of ST. John's, Newcastle, by Messrs Major and Kell of Heworth, reached the sum of £31. 1s 6d. They were ably assisted by Messrs Burnup, Alcock and Laidler of St. John's.

Aug 19th. There was collected on the Quayside by Messrs Sewell, J. Wylam and T. Sill of the Heworth Relief Committee, the sum of £14. 14s. 6d. And on the same day the same three gentlemen added the sum of £19 12s 0d to their earlier collection in the parish of St. Andrews.

Graham Clark Esq. (grandfather of Elizabeth Barrett Browning) gave £5 to the collection.

Sept 1st. Further collections were made in St. Nicholas Parish, in Pilgrim Street, Quayside, Sandgate, and All Saints by the Heworth gentlemen, and from the tiny village of Lesbury in Northumberland, the church congregation sent £4. 1s 1d.

In addition the members of the Heworth Committee receive gifts of even the smallest amount, viz 3d, in and about the villages of Yelling and Heworth."

Tyne Mercury. Sept 8th.

On September 15th 1812 the Tyne Mercury announced that the funeral sermon preached by the Revd. John Hodgson in Heworth Chapel, at the burial service of the victims of the Felling Colliery Explosion, was to be published, together with a description of the colliery workings and an account of the accident. The proceeds of the sale of the publication will go to the relief fund for the bereaved.

On September 22nd 1812 the Tyne Mercury stated that, "An adjourned meeting of the gentlemen who manage the Felling Fund, will be held at the Felling Colliery Office, Felling Hall, on Friday the 25th of September at 11 o'clock."

As late as February 9th 1813 subscriptions to the Felling Sufferers Fund were still coming in. The Tyne Mercury mentioned contributions from the parishes of Stannington and Netherwitton.

September 28th 1813. Explosion at Fatfield Colliery.
"The Hall-Pit at Fatfield Colliery in the parish of Chester-le-Street, fired from the foul air, and thirty four were killed - 10 men and 24 boys."

"The Vicar of Heworth, the Revd. John Hodgson, did not confine his efforts on behalf of victims of mining accidents to his own parish, but engaged to use his knowledge and expertise to publicise the fatal accident at Fatfield."

Nov. 7th 1813. "On Sunday evening, at Bishopwearmouth Church, after an excellent sermon by the Revd John Hodgson, of Tarrow, upwards of £25 was collected for the relatives of the sufferers of Fatfield Colliery."

Tyne Mercury.

The Heworth Committee closed the fund for the relief of the Felling widows and orphans on December 31st, 1813, publishing the final account in local newspapers, as follows:-

All the objects of the fund receive weekly parochial relief in addition to any aid from the fund, and are provided with house and firing by the owners of Felling Colliery.

'The Safety Lamp'
 from 'A Cavalcade of History' (1953.) (in part.)

January 9th. 1816.

On January 8th 1816, the Rev. John Hodgson, Rector of Jarrow, near Newcastle upon Tyne, received from Sir Humphry Davy, two lamps. Davy wrote that he believed his invention would solve the problem of illumination in coal mines, but he had not put the lamps to a test.

He asked John Hodgson to take the lamps down a mine and give them a practical test. Hodgson's satisfaction at the receipt of the lamps was genuine, because he had great faith in Davy's scientific abilities, though he knew that there was a grave risk of explosion if the lamps failed to act.

Up to this time, pitmen, knowing that methane gas, or "fire-damp" as they called it, was explosive, rarely dared to use naked flames below ground. They used a steel mill, a disc of steel which when revolved against a piece of flint, gave off feeble sparks. The device was reasonably safe but gave very little light.

Davy's idea was to enclose a small flame within a lantern made of fine wire gauges. In his experiments, he had found that a flame would not pass through minute tubes. It occurred to him that a sheet of wire gauge was equivalent to a series of tubes, placed in rows. He therefore encircled the lamp's flame with a cylinder of gauge. The inflammable air or gases could get through the gauge, reaching the flame, but could not come outside the gauge when ignited, thus preventing explosions.

Davy had been in contact with John Hodgson for several years, ever since Hodgson enlisted his help after a terrible explosion occurred in the John Pit of Felling Colliery on Monday, May 25th, 1812, killing 92 men and boys.

Felling Colliery was in Hodgson's parish (he lived only a mile away), and he suffered great anguish at the deaths of so many of his people. He vowed to work towards relieving the dangers of explosions in coal pits, of which there were several in his parish. He knew that the owners of collieries did not care.

In 1815 Sir Humphry Davy was visiting Northumberland. John Hodgson and his friend John Buddle, a colliery engineer from Wallsend, met him and explained the facts of explosions in coal mines to him. Davy promised to give his whole attention to the problem and asked them to send him samples of fire-damp at regular intervals.

Thus it was, that on January 9th, 1816, John Hodgson descended into the pit at Hebburn Colliery, carrying one of Davy's lamps, with the colliery engineer holding the other. The owner, Cuthbert Ellison Esq. M.P. of Hebburn Hall, was Hodgson's friend and readily gave his permission.

At first the miners were horrified to see what appeared to be glowing lanterns coming among them. Their language was not fit for the ears of a parson! Hodgson reassured them as best he could. He spent enough time in the foul air of the pit workings to be sure that the lamps really worked, for even at the presence of a tiny amount of methane gas, the yellow flame turned blue, but there was no ignition of the gas.

Sir Humphry Davy published his experiments, giving John Hodgson great credit for his courageous trial of his safety lamp in Hebburn Pit. The Royal Society offered Hodgson an honorary membership in 1818.

While Davy was working on his safety lamp, so also was the famous colliery engineer and railway pioneer, George Stephenson, at Killingworth Colliery, near Newcastle. Stephenson was as brave as Hodgson, and his lamp, very similar to Davy's, was successfully proved in 1817. Thus two men invented miners' safety lamps which bore their names - The Davy Lamp and the Geordie Lamp. Both saved many lives.

were many who were in favour of offering the crown to Espartero and had he been so minded he could have become king, aged though he was.

The Safety Lamp

Over one hundred and twenty years ago to-day the Davy safety-lamp was first used in a coal-mine.

On January 8th, 1816, the Rev. John Hodgson, Rector of Jarrow, Newcastle-on-Tyne, received from Sir Humphry Davy two lamps. Davy wrote that he believed his invention would solve the problem of illumination in mines, but he had never really put the lamps to a test.

Hodgson's satisfaction at the receipt of the lamps was unrestrained. Although he had been asked by Davy to take one of the lamps down a mine and give it a practical test, he had such confidence in the great scientist that he had little fear of the result. Hodgson knew, however, that there was a grave risk of explosion if the lamp failed to act.

Up to this time miners, when working in foul air, used a steel mill—a disc of steel that was kept revolving in contact with a piece of flint. This device was safe enough, but it gave little light.

Davy's scheme was to enclose the flame in a lantern made of wire gauze.

On January 9th Hodgson descended into the pit carrying with him a Davy lamp. What effect the introduction of a light into the mine would have had on the miners can be easily imagined. It appears, however, that the parson kept his experiment to himself.

In Hebburn pit he walked about in an atmosphere of fire-damp with the utmost courage. As he moved from one point to another the lamp became full of blazing gas, but there was no explosion.

Then the most dramatic incident of the whole episode occurred. Hodgson wandered about swinging the lamp, holding it high and low, until he drew near a miner who

worked laboriously by the indifferent light of a steel mill. As the light from Hodgson's lamp approached the miner looked up.

He saw what was apparently a candle whose flame burned without protection. The shock was almost too much for him. "Put out the light," he roared.

But when no attention was paid to his cries and the glow came nearer and nearer he began to use language that was not fit for the ears of a parson.

He took Hodgson to be a comrade with incendiary inclinations.

The miner changed his tune. He gave up swearing and tried wheedling instead. Surely, he thought, the man with the light was mad!

Hodgson made no reply. He moved nearer to the miner and halted within a few paces. Then the workman could see who it was, for Hodgson was well known and respected among the pitmen.

There was a smile of triumph on the face of the parson, who, however, was somewhat conscience-stricken at having given the man a fright. He admitted afterwards that he ought to have prepared the miner for the shock.

The Rev. John Hodgson was one of the pioneers who influenced Sir Humphry Davy to produce his lamp.

Up to the early years of the nineteenth century calamities in the mines through fire-damp had been frequent, but no one concerned with the pits, or the profits they brought, considered it worth while to try to remedy the matter.

It was left to a few humanitarians to induce scientists to bestir themselves.

In August, 1815, Sir Humphry Davy was travelling through Northumberland. His reputation as a scientist was known all over England and, indeed, the Continent.

A certain Dr. Gray, rector of Bishopwearmouth, implored him to stay in Newcastle and examine the possibility of relieving the danger from explosions in the mines.

Mr. Hodgson and a colliery engineer named Buddle, put Davy in possession of the facts. It was the first time his attention had been drawn to circumstances under which the colliers worked.

He came back to London in a thoughtful mood. After a series of experiments he found that a flame would not

Gentlemen

It is with sensations of regret mingled with pleasure that I beg to inform you that I have today resigned into the hands of the Bishop of Durham the living of Jarrow-with-Heworth. I regret that the long and amicable connection upwards of a quarter of a century that has subsisted between the parish and myself has thus been rather suddenly severed; but I rejoice with hope that all its best interests will be promoted by my yielding up a charge to which I have not been able within some years past to pay the attention which its very important nature demanded.

A sprung from the affectionate regard and friendship which I feel I shall always feel for the inhabitants of the Chapelry of Heworth and of the great satisfaction which I shall always have in hearing of both their spiritual and temporal welfare



PLAN OF SITTINGS IN HEWORTH OLD CHURCH, 1710-1822.


According to the overseers' accounts, a new basin was provided for "the font stone" in 1797. At the same end of the chapel, below the level of the floor, in the north-west corner, a hypocaust, furnace, or some other type of heating apparatus seems to have been installed for the comfort of the congregation when the nights were cold and long. Some indication of a provision of this sort appears to be drawn in a ground plan of the chapel, copied by Mr. Hodgson, on a blank leaf of the register, to illustrate the minutes of a vestry meeting held in 1822. Artificial illumination during the same seasons was supplied by candles mounted in brackets attached to the walls, and by oil lamps hung from the rafters. The parish accounts of sundry expenses incurred by the chapel wardens towards the latter end of the eighteenth century and the beginning of the next contain frequent references to the purchase of "lamps, candles, coal, oil and snuffers" for these purposes.

Unfortunately, there is now no evidence to show in what manner the sanctuary was divided from the chancel or the chancel from the nave. Our copy of the ground plan merely shows the position of the altar, within the communion rails, under the east window. It is possible that the only structural differences effected were merely a series of gradual elevations on the floor level and maybe a wooden arch to span the roof. These conjectures, however, it must be admitted, are only based upon a knowledge of the practice usually adopted under similar conditions elsewhere. The altar consisted of massive black oak table, plainly carved and most solidly framed. It was probably the only piece of furniture in the place—with the exception of

giving access to a gallery above. On the south side the arrangement was more involved and impressive. Here the transept was divided transversely, through half its length, by a wall screen extending to the roof, and sub-divided longitudinally on the ground floor of the section thus cut off from the main body of the building by another wall, thus forming an extensive porch on the one hand and a "public waiting room" on the other (now used as a robing room by the choristers), and on the first floor by a ministers' vestry and a landing approached by a winding staircase based on the floor of the porch below. Access to another public gallery situated in the south transept, similar to that on the north side, was obtained through a door in the division wall communicating with the same landing and reached by the same flight of stairs. At the western end the ingress was similarly involved; the floor of the porch being the base of the tower and the roof of the cellar—an architectural incongruity most difficult to condone. The walls of the tower at this level are immensely thick and were pierced on the right by a vaulted arch to admit a passage to the nave, the gallery at this end of the building being the third with which it was furnished, and the only one yet remaining, being reached by way of the belfry stairs.

The accompanying plan—copied from the original prepared by Thomas Sopwith in 1822—illustrates the arrangement of the seating accommodation and describes the actual number of the sittings provided. According to Hodgson they exceeded by six times those previously provided, and it will be observed, as hinted above, that every

Ordered that Mr Cummins in Gateshead be employed to make a tablet and gild the inscription on a Black Ground, required by the Society for promoting the building and enlarging of Churches & Chapels, on account of their subscription of £400 towards the expense of rebuilding the Chapel.

Ordered that Mr Sopwith under Mr Hodgson & Mr Coulthard be employed to make a Vestry table & two arm chairs & two forms for the Vestry; also 4 kneeling stools; and the Communion Table to be lengthened.

Ordered also that Mr James Wardropper be employed to set up the Chapel Yard gates.

Ordered that 3 iron bannisters be put into the rails of the Pulpit stairs, and that the opening between the pulpit and the S.W. Angle of the Chapel be closed up.

Ordered also that a sounding board on such a design as the minister and churchwardens should approve of, be made by Mr Sopwith.

13th of June 1822.

Ordered that James Wardropper be employed to lay the flagging of the Churchyard at two shillings a yard, he finding ashes and removing all the rubbish into such parts of the Chapel yard as Mr Hodgson may direct. At a meeting of the Commissioners for Rebuilding Heworth Chapel and other inhabitants of the Chappel Holden according to Notice duly published in the said Chapel, it was unanimously agreed to petition the Lord Bishop of Durham to consecrate and set apart the said Chapel from all profane and common uses and dedicate and consecrate the same to the Honour and Worship of Almighty God, and to the celebration of Divine Offices therein; and assign it to be perpetually the Chapel of Heworth, aforesaid, for the purpose of assembling therein to hear Divine Service, according to the Usage of the Church of England.

At the same time it was agreed that from 1200 to 1400 tickets be printed and distributed for the purpose of admitting persons into the chapel on the day of consecration, and that the Constables of the Chappel be directed to attend at the gates and doors of the Chapel for the purpose of keeping order and receiving the tickets of the persons to be admitted to the ceremony.

It was also agreed that this meeting be adjourned to Wednesday the 7th of August at 9 o'clock in the morning.
